#### **United Way**

Jose Diaz was approached by Pam Toll who would like a member of HRT to join board. It costs \$300/year.

There is no Latino representation on the board at the moment.

It would keep us in touch with what grants are available and enable connections with other organizations.

Early learning is a current focus of the United Way, the HRT member on the board can remind other board members of Latino community needs.

Veronica Bronkema was nominated and approved to apply for the United Way Board position.

### Family Investment Report

3/10 of 1% initiative

for the November ballot

citizen initiative

60% would go to jail and law enforcement

40% would go to cities with an emphasis on early intervention

city councils need to put it on the ballot

Its passing would mean a raise in current sales tax, not a reallocation

There is a grandfather clause, 10 years

#### LEAD program

WSU Extension may be able to provide the organizational response for this grant.

There are 6 nonprofits asking for \$500,000 for 3 years

Paul Allen will only entertain one grant from WSU Extension each guarter

Thurston County Chamber of Commerce and the United Way are other options for support.

Needed – fiscal agent with grantor, an agency that can train a nonprofit organization, an organization with experience in large grants.

#### Families for Kids - Stephanie Hills

Small nonprofit group – contract with WA State for recruitment and retention of foster homes in the region

The state is in need of Hispanic homes

Children are being pulled out of Hispanic families and being placed in English speaking homes Many are grade school aged and younger children

There are around 7.000 foster kids in WA State

There are 1200-1500 waiting for adoptive homes

Stephanie guesses that Hispanics make up close to 10% of these kids.

This program is being mentioned in El Informador whenever there is an empty space

This program will be added to website

Questions of parents in detention and what happens to the children were raised by Fanny and Uriel.

Stephanie will get us contacts in DSHS who can answer these questions as she did not know the answers.

### Gayle Hosklson – USDA, Rural Development program

Only work in rural areas

Most of WA state is rural, including much of Thurston and surrounding counties

They provide loans and grants- utilities, water, new home and home repair, multi-family and senior facilities, farm labor housing, community facilities (medical, educational, cultural, fire, police, city hall, libraries)

Low to moderate income individuals are eligible.

Mutual self-help program – grants to organizations that help people buy their own homes.

They offer guaranteed loans, direct loans, and grants.

They have broadband and distance learning programs.

Business & industry loans – give loans to organizations which then reloan those funds.

There is a Children's Health Program that provides health care for undocumented children.

Funding has finally been approved so these slots need to be filled so that people understand they are needed.

Basic Health can also provide health care for documented or undocumented based on income.

These two programs are the only ones that undocumented immigrants are eligible for in our state.
