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Each year the challenge for the Hispanic Roundtable and the Latino Youth Summit Committee members is to match or exceed the success of the summit the year before and so far we have been able to meet that challenge. The 2007 Latino Youth Summit was held on November 13th at Centralia College and we had approximately 470 Latino students from Grays Harbor, Lewis, Mason, Pacific and Thurston Counties participate in the all day event. We also had over 50 community and educational tables offering information on the resources available to support and help build leadership within the Latino community.

The summit began with a warm welcome from the Hispanic Roundtable president, celebrating the 5th year of the annual event, followed by Dr. James Walton, president of Centralia College, who welcomed the students and encouraged them to take the necessary steps needed to obtain degrees and become the future leaders of our communities. The keynote speaker was Richard "Mr. Chocolate" Santana who is the founder of Homeboy Goes To Harvard Productions. He shared his story as a third generation gang member who went on to earn a Master's degree at Harvard University. Mr. Santana demonstrated to students and educators how he accomplished *The Change* that occurred in his life -- and can occur in anyone's life. He set the tone for the summit's day long event.

The 2007 Latino Youth Summit's theme "Owning My Future" was accompanied by an image provided by Pedro "Elijah" De Valdivia, whose artwork reflects and embraces the challenge of meeting the educational and leadership needs of Latino youth. In addition, the summit provided Latino community leaders from many professional arenas across the state to encourage the Latino youths to take the necessary steps to reach their career goals.

The Latino Youth Summit's success has been a strong level of support from all our partners. Partners include colleges and universities, school officials, state and local agency professionals, area business leaders, and Latino students and parents. Your contribution helped to deliver a strong, positive message of encouragement to Latino and Latina high school students.

In addition, school counselors in each of the participating schools played a critical role in identifying and recruiting Hispanic youths to participate in the summit.
